
Library Services & Technology Act (LSTA) funding strengthens libraries in rural Montana

What does LSTA mean for Montana?

In 2024, the Whitefish Community Library upgraded its network with support from LSTA funding. Before the project, wireless download speeds were just 12 Mbps. After the upgrades, speeds soared to 522 Mbps, enabling more patrons to engage in bandwidth-heavy activities like virtual interviews and online classes. Last year, the library's network supported 6,417 public computer and Wi-Fi sessions. The upgrades also extended wireless access to the community room, enhancing the library's ability to host training and educational programs for learners of all ages.

LSTA Grants Boost Technology and Digital Literacy for Montanans

Libraries are essential to Montana's communities, often serving as the only source of free, reliable Internet in rural areas where connectivity is critical. Internet access is essential for education, employment, and staying informed, making libraries a lifeline for many Montanans.

Upgrades to library networks, including firewalls, switches, and Wi-Fi access points, have boosted broadband speeds by up to 400% in 39 public libraries. These improvements help patrons stream classes, apply for jobs, and access telehealth services.

Additionally, 86 libraries across 51 counties provide **mobile hotspots**, bridging the gap for those without home Internet or with temporary connectivity needs. Montanans use these devices to stay informed, apply for jobs, and connect with loved ones.

Digital opportunity plans ensure libraries can meet future technology demands while emphasizing digital literacy training. Eight libraries completed plans in 2024. By providing both access and education, Montana's libraries remain vital hubs for connection and opportunity.
